
Mr. McGrory,

Earlier this month, the Boston Globe (and the Philly Inquirer) said that an examination of court records, media reports, and interviews with church officials, victims, and attorneys led to the conclusion that more than 130 bishops, or nearly one-third of those still living, have been accused during their careers of inadequately responding to sexual misconduct in their dioceses.

Is there some way this can be verified? If so, would it be okay to have someone do so?

Dear Mr. Donohue -- As the primary editor of our report on the bishops with the Philadelphia Inquirer, I wanted to respond to your request for information about our finding that nearly a third of them have been accused of failing to adequately respond to sexual misconduct.

A group of seven reporters in Boston and Philadelphia reviewed the public records of all living bishops, including media reports, court records and interviews with sources all over the country.

We entered all of the information into a spreadsheet which we then reviewed as a group, eliminating accusations that were frivolous or unsubstantiated. We ended up with more than 130 named bishops who have faced accusations at some point in their career.

We chose not to publish the spreadsheet because the point of our exercise was not to fault individual bishops. Instead, we were demonstrating the widespread lack of accountability in the church hierarchy. We have already turned down a request for the spreadsheet from a group that advocates for victims of clergy sexual abuse.

I hope this helps you understand our process.
