

Parental Consent Requirements

Indoor Tanning

- Alabama: Ages 15-17 require parental consent to be given in person
- Alaska: No restrictions
- Arizona: Under the age of 18 requires parental consent to be given in person
- Arkansas: Under the age of 18 requires parental consent to be given in person
- California: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Colorado: No restrictions
- Connecticut: Totally banned under the age of 17
- Delaware: Totally banned under the age of 18
- District of Columbia: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Florida: Ages 14-18 require parental consent and must wear eye protection, under age 14 requires parental accompaniment
- Georgia: Ages 14-18 require parental consent
- Hawaii: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Idaho: Ages 14-17 require parental consent to be given in person, any minor with a doctor's prescription
- Illinois: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Indiana: Ages 16-17 require written parental consent
- Iowa: No restrictions
- Kansas: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Kentucky: Ages 14-17 require written parental consent that is valid for 12 months
- Louisiana: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Maine: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Maryland: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Massachusetts: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Michigan: Under the age of 18 requires written parental consent that is valid for 12 months
- Minnesota: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Mississippi: Ages 14-17 require written parental consent that is filled out in person and valid for 12 months, under the age of 14 requires parental accompaniment
- Missouri: Under 17 requires written parental consent that is filled out in person and valid for 12 months

- Montana: No restrictions
- Nebraska: Under the age of 16 requires written parental consent before each visit
- Nevada: Totally banned under the age of 18
- New Hampshire: Totally banned under the age of 18
- New Jersey: Age 17 requires parental consent and accompaniment for first time
- New Mexico: No restrictions
- New York: Totally banned under the age of 18
- North Carolina: Totally banned under the age of 18
- North Dakota: Under 14 requires parental accompaniment, under 18 requires parental written consent to be filled out in person and valid for 12 months
- Ohio: Ages 16-17 require signed in person parental consent for 902 but not more than 45 visits, under 16 requires parent accompaniment
- Oklahoma: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Oregon: Under age 18 only permitted with a doctor's prescription
- Pennsylvania: Age 17 requires parental consent in writing
- Rhode Island: Totally banned under the age of 18
- South Carolina: Under age 18 requires parental consent in person
- South Dakota: No restrictions
- Tennessee: Ages 14-18 require parental consent in person, ages 14-18 require parental accompaniment on first visit
- Texas: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Utah: Under age 18 requires parental consent in person or with signed permission slip or order from physician
- Vermont: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Virginia: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Washington: Under age 18 only permitted with a doctor's prescription
- West Virginia: Totally banned under the age of 18
- Wisconsin: No restrictions ages 16 and up
- Wyoming: Ages 15-18 parental consent signed in person and valid for 12 months
