Operation Lone Star

Beginning in 2021, Texas Governor Gregg Abbott launched Operation Lone Star, a joint operation between the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Military Department along the United States–Mexico border in southern Texas. The operation is currently ongoing. According to Abbott, the operation is intended to counter a rise in illegal immigration, the illegal drug trade, and human smuggling. Beginning in April of 2022, Texas began relocating migrants to sanctuary cities.

As of January 26, 2024, Texas has transported approximately 102,100 migrants to 6 cities. Below is a breakdown of the cities and the numbers of migrants.

- Over 12,500 migrants to Washington, D.C. since April 2022
- Over 37,500 migrants to New York City since August 2022
- Over 31,200 migrants to Chicago since August 2022
- Over 3,400 migrants to Philadelphia since November 2022
